Rector's Letter

"For it is by grace that you have been saved, through faith – and this is not from yourselves, it is the gift of God.." Ephesians chapter 2 verse 8

'Dust & Glory'

Dear Friends,

This year, the Church of England's Lent material, 'Dust and Glory' incorporates key themes of faith, failure and forgiveness inviting us to find God in the mess of our everyday lives. Whether or not you are in a house group or have joined a Lent group, whether or not you have purchased a copy of 'Dust and Glory', can I encourage you to use this 40-day period as special time with God, in prayer, bible reading, reflection and study. Paul in his letter to the Ephesians reminds us that it is only by grace that we are saved, God through Jesus has done it all for us.

Our mission statement for SWCD Churches, launched in January this year, reminds us that we are seeking to 'worship God, love our communities and grow in faith'. As many of you will know by now, I am by no stretch of the imagination a gardener, but I do know that when a plant ceases to grow, it dies. This is a challenging analogy to apply to our faith. Are you growing? Are you learning new things about all that God is and has for you or are you just relying on the former things?

Lent is not the only time when I will be encouraging us to grow in our faith; it is, after all, something that should only end when we stand before our maker in glory. But Lent is perhaps a good time to re-focus and re-start that growth, giving as it does a pattern and a discipline as we journey through the 40 days towards the events of Holy week and Easter when we see the glory through the dust.

Bishop's Letter

'When we hoe a field'

'When we hoe a field, we all start in this corner and we go this way' is my favourite Zambian proverb. I've been sharing its words with people from our parishes, schools and chaplaincies as a way of inviting us all to think about how our diocesan vision can be refreshed and developed to help us look towards the future with confidence and joy.

Our vision calls us to 'live and tell the story of Jesus'. It speaks of faith in action. It makes clear that all we do is in the name of Jesus. And it's full of aspiration; living out its words is a life-long task.

But what might our vision mean in terms of what we'd like to focus on specifically? This is where my Zambian proverb comes in. For my sense is that in our common life we would be strengthened if we had a greater focus of what we're all working towards together.

To help us think about this, I'm suggesting four themes that I hope we can all get behind. The aim is not to generate a new initiative, rather it's to identify priorities for our common life upon which we can all focus. Our diverse communities of course mean that anything we do needs to fit local contexts. But I hope the four themes can provide a common framework that will help us all.

Under our overall vision of 'living and telling the story of Jesus', the themes are: (1) Valuing and cherishing the people we already have, (2) Offering worship and sharing our faith together in new and different ways, (3) Developing our own faith and the faith of others. (4) Sharing in ministry and leadership.

I'm inviting everyone to have their say about how these could be developed, adapted or altered. Please do speak with each other and your local church, school and chaplaincy leaders about how this can happen where you are. Please be part of the conversation! Your insights, thoughts and experience are invaluable in helping us think together what it means to 'live and tell the story of Jesus'. Bishop Michael

What On Earth Are We Doing?

Children and the church, some good news and a challenge!

One of the things I often hear said around our churches is something along the lines of 'Isn't it sad that we don't have children in our churches in the way we used to?'. I share this sadness; however, the reality is that the days when children just came to church as a matter of course are probably over. Of course, we still want to welcome all generations into our churches and please be assured you will always be welcome to bring children, grandchildren, neighbours and others to any of our services, particularly to those services with more of an all-age focus.

However, even if Sunday attendance amongst children is not as it used to be, the great thing is that we are still seeing children in our churches and finding other ways for them to hear the good news of Jesus in increasing numbers. I want to share three initiatives we are involved in where this is already happening.

'Open the Book' and other schools initiatives. Each week a team from SWCD churches and the Baptist Church takes interactive assemblies into a number of our local schools, telling Bible stories and sharing good news. I, and other colleagues also have the opportunity to take increasing numbers of assemblies, RE lessons etc in our local schools whilst the Parish Church in Street will be hosting an 'Easter Experience' for most of the pupils at Elmhurst this month.

'Little Stars', our term time pre-school group in the Mission Church is seeing growing numbers of families attending for a time of play, friendship and a Christian story or song. 'Messy Church'. This is now running in both Walton and Street and is seeing more primary school age children and their families coming along for a time of worship, stories, craft and food. Children are coming to our churches and hearing the Christian message even if this is happening in a new way! And now to the challenge. All of the above activities need people and all of them

would welcome new people (you!) to get involved. If you are someone who longs to see more children hearing the good news of Jesus, could you be part of making that happen? What's this about a Carbon Fast for Lent?

If you have seen the weekly news-sheet Lifeline recently you will see that we suggest a weekly Carbon Fast through Lent. With a different topic each week there are several actions from which to choose one or more to try. Why are we doing this? It is because, as Christians, we are called to care for Creation. We are invited to live more simply, reduce our ecological footprint and live in deeper harmony with all life on God's earth. The Carbon Fast is environmental action which witnesses to ourselves and others that we are taking this seriously. It is intended to be a part of our Lenten spiritual devotion, and helps us discover the benefits of stewarding resources. Many are already taking 'green' actions and will be familiar with basic ways of cutting waste and recycling; for others the ideas may be new and untried. Most actions are intended to be the start of a new way of living. Savings (in money and carbon) may not be immediate but the increasing effects will make a difference to your lifestyle and to the future of God's wider creation. Let us challenge ourselves and lead by example towards a better world.

If you wish to track the impact your changes are having you could calculate your carbon footprint using the calculator on the 360° Carbon website at: https://footprintr.me/ and check again later to see your progress.

Lent is also an opportunity to reflect on what it means to be concerned for, and to pray about the whole inhabited planet as God commanded. When praying be aware of the destructive effects of climate change on our linked communities overseas; droughts, excessive heat, flooding and rising sea levels. Combating climate change means being aware of the impacts it will have not just on us but also on our neighbours across the world, particularly the poorest and most vulnerable. You may wish to use the Carbon Fast Prayer below:

Most loving Creator God who has given us a world full of delights and wonders; As we prepare with the grace of selfsacrifice and self discipline for the great festival of Easter remind us how to treasure these gifts and to use them with care; So that all may equally share in the earth's bounty and all creation may be restored to your image through Jesus Christ our Lord.

CHARITABLE GIVING 2023

The Benefice charitable giving group recently presented a paper to each of our PCCs reflecting on our giving over the last couple of years.

There is much to celebrate. Each of our parishes remains committed to giving in support of other organisations, alongside giving to the mission and ministry of our churches and there was a sense in which, inviting nominations for support from the congregation, had given more 'ownership' of the organisations that we decided to support.

However, we recognised, that there was still much to do in raising the profile of our supported organisations and engaging the church family in their work and ministry. One of the problems identified was the fact that we actually support a large number, and it was difficult for us to keep up with all of them.

The PCCs have agreed that we will, as a result of these reflections, refine our charitable giving for 2023, looking to support just two organisations per parish with, in addition, every effort made to find an organisation that we can support across the parishes as a whole benefice. Those we support should, if possible, be a mixture of local and international.

We are therefore, once again, asking the church family to nominate charities we could support for their parish. If you have a nomination please can you let me know, by the end of March, so that these can go to our next PCC meetings for discussion and approval. A reminder of the criteria we agreed, some two years ago, for the kinds of organisations that we are looking to support.

Principles for SWCD Churches Charitable Giving

- 1. Where possible we aim to support organisations who are specifically Christian, or where no such organisation can be found, those that have a Christian ethos.
- 2. We value personal contact with those we support and particularly welcome proposals from church family members with personal links to a particular charity or cause.
- 3. To ensure transparency and accountability, we will generally channel our support through UK registered charities.
- 4. Our PCC's will always make the final decision on which charities each parish will support, informed by recommendations from church members, which have been reviewed by the churches charitable giving committee from across the benefice.
- 5. Our support will be limited to a single year unless longer term support is specifically proposed and agreed by a PCC.

If you have an organisation that you think your PCC should consider supporting please do nominate them. One of the ways in which we want to try and raise the profile of the organisations we support is by designating 'champions' for each one, a person who will be prepared to be the contact point, to share details of the organisation's work both through our publications and at one of two services during the year when our focus will be particularly on our supported charities. If this is something that you would also consider undertaking, please let me know.

Our support makes a huge difference to our partners, transforming communities and saving lives both locally and around the world. Thank you for being part of that.

Some reflections following the recent General Synod debate on human sexuality.

I am writing this in the same week that the Church of England General Synod has passed a motion concerning the blessing of same sex marriages in church. This follows a long debate within the church, including the 'Living in Love and Faith' courses run in this Deanery and across the Church of England last year. You may have seen this decision reported in the national media, although I have yet to see the detail of precisely what has been proposed and what that might mean for me as your Rector. I intend to wait for this detail and give myself time to reflect and pray before I respond on the specific proposals.

What I can say now is that my understanding is that the motion does not seek to change the church's fundamental teaching and doctrine on marriage. However, much of the recent debate and discussion following this decision, has been unhelpful, either led by people with extreme positions on either side of the discussion, or by those looking in from outside the church, the latter who sometimes offer comment without necessarily an understanding of either the theological background or the long process that has led us to this point.

I wanted, therefore, at this stage, to offer a theological reflection which, I hope, will serve to counterbalance some of the unfortunate reporting that has surrounded this issue.

Firstly, we should remind ourselves that, as a church, we are primarily called to follow Jesus. This may seem obvious but even a cursory study of the gospels will show us that this might mean standing against current cultural norms and expectations. Jesus was frequently criticised for mixing with the 'wrong' sort of people and having the 'wrong' sorts of views and therefore we should expect (maybe even welcome?) similar criticism as his followers. We are not called to simply conform to our current culture and societal expectations, indeed there are occasions when we should be bold in speaking out against them on issues of justice and morality, even when that makes us unpopular. In this context, calls for the church to be 'progressive' or 'move with the times' on human sexuality or indeed other issues, misses the point of what the church is actually about. Ephesians chapter 4 verse 14 reminds us that we are not to be people that are 'tossed back and forth by the waves and blown here and there by every wind of teaching'. Any decisions about human sexuality, as with all our decisions, should not be based on cultural expectations or

what others might say, but rather on our understanding of the teachings and example of our Saviour.

Secondly, we should remind ourselves that we are called to love radically and inclusively. These words have often been mis-used or appropriated to support a particular perspective, but they are actually at the core of what it means to love. Our new mission statement asks us to seek to 'love our communities' and that includes everyone, whether or not we agree with their life choices and whether or not they are 'people like us'. What I find uniquely wonderful about our Christian community is how diverse we are; we come in all shapes and sizes and bring with us life experiences, histories and opinions that in most other settings would mean we had very little to do with each other. When we share the peace with one another on a Sunday, we are surely tangibly affirming this love; a love we share indiscriminately when we invite others to join us in our journey of faith.

Finally, we should also remind ourselves that we all come to this discussion as an imperfect people, sinners saved by grace.

When we pray the Lord's Prayer together, each week we ask God to 'forgive us our sins as we forgive those who sin against us'. Sin may not be a popular concept in the world but, as

Christians, we know that we are both in need of forgiveness and called to forgive others. Romans chapter 3 verse 23 reminds us that 'all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God' and Jesus had equally hard teaching both for those like the Pharisees that seemed to believe that they were without sin and those who felt able to judge other peoples' sin without acknowledging their own, as in the story of the woman caught in adultery (John chapter 8 verses 1 – 11). When discussing human sexuality or indeed other similarly contentious issues, we would do well to begin by recognising our own fallibility and imperfect understanding of the depth and breadth of all that God has to offer to all his people.

I know this is a subject that will raise strong feelings and strong opinions and, if there is anyone who would like to discuss it further, please do come and see me. My prayer is that we can hold any such ongoing discussions, whether here, or in the national church in a spirit of grace and peace.

God's Economics for Tough Times

"... DO NOT WORRY ABOUT TOMORROW ... ' MATTHEW 6:34 NKJV

A television news announcer once quipped, 'Speaking of the economy, if it weren't for bad news there'd be no news at all!' Each time we face a downturn we tend to forget we've 'been there, done that' and got through it by God's grace. Like ancient Israel we anticipate doom, spread discouragement, join those who gripe about the government, and long for 'the good old days.' How does the God who brought water from the rock, manna from the sky and ravens to feed a hungry prophet expect His people to respond to tough financial times?

The answer is: choose the right economy! As a believer you must choose between two economies. The first is the kingdom of God where He rules and reigns, owns all resources and dispenses them generously to meet His people's needs, independent of global economic conditions. The second is the kingdom of this world where men compete selfishly to be number one.

In God's upside-down kingdom the rules are reversed. He says, "... My ways [are] higher than your ways and my thoughts than your thoughts" (Isaiah 55:9 NIV). In this world's kingdom where the rule is, 'Get what you can and can what you get,' you're always vulnerable to greed and manipulation. So God told His people, '... Choose for yourselves ... whom you will serve ...' (Joshua 24:15 NIV). Which economy will you choose? If you are wise, you will put your faith in God's economy, trust Him, and 'don't worry about tomorrow!'
